# 245. Apologies

# 250. To receive updates from Coventry City Councillors

# **Councillor Sawdon**

Councillor Sawdon said that in his opinion if politicians don't keep their promise, then they should be punished, the same should be said for Officers who don't keep their promise.

<u>Road markings</u> – Almost 2 years ago, it was stated that, the lane markings should be completed by the beginning of this year, the work remained outstanding. Councillor Sawdon had emailed the Officers responsible, but no reply had been received.

<u>No U-Turn Signage on St Martins Road</u> – Councillor Sawdon confirmed he had not received a response to his emails chasing an update and no work had been completed.

Kings Hill – nothing new to report.

<u>Footway on Brentwood Avenue</u> – it was confirmed that the repairs were scheduled for March.

#### **Councillor John Blundell**

<u>Pollution tubes</u> – Councillor Blundell confirmed that there was no further news on the pollution tubes and no further data was available. The data for other areas in Coventry had been looked at. CCC had confirmed that they were not willing to re-site the pollution tubes as they considered they were in the correct place. It was stated that they were the experts. It appeared that there were places in Coventry that do exceed the recommended levels eg Holyhead Road. It was noted that it remained to be seen if the scheme being installed made any difference.

Councillor Mrs Bush added that Daleway Road and Erithway Road was blocked solid with traffic for an hour in the mornings and the evenings due to the amount of vehicles on the school run.

It was reported that there was an experiment currently near Templars School which limited vehicles around the school at certain times of the day. If this was successful then this could be looked at in other areas in Coventry.

**ACTION**: Councillor Blundell to ask what the criteria was for placing pollution tubes in areas. Rationale to be shared with the FPC.

# 254. Kings Coronation

#### 255. Brentwood Avenue/Hadleigh Road traffic calming

Councillor Morshead had suggested 8 ideas for discussion.

It was noted that FPC were in full support of some form of traffic calming measurers, and measures were needed to slow down the traffic down. People were using the roads as a shortcut on their commute. Needed to change the balance so that it was quicker to go the right way rather than use a residential shortcut.

The Parish Council had been quoted as willing to provide a financial contribution to any scheme installed by CCC. The Clerk had emailed Councillor Hetherton several times to ascertain what was being discussed. Sadly, to date, no reply had been received. Clearly Councillor Hetherton felt there was no need to work with the Parish Council.

It was noted, however, that CCC needed to inform FPC what they were planning, and the cost involved. It was agreed that should CCC put the measurers in place then FPC could make a small donation to the scheme. Consideration needed to be taken into account that other roads within Finham require similar schemes and the Parish Council needed to be fair to all residents.

#### 256. Defibrillators

Councillor Baker updated that he had spoken to the Manager at McColls, who had been very helpful. They would be willing to help out with siting a defibrillator on the outside of the shop wall. She would report back after she had spoken to the landlord.

**ACTION**: Councillor Baker to chase a response.

#### 257. Cycleway

Councillor Morshead updated that he had made contact with an organisation called Cycleways who were based in Kenilworth. This was an active group who were good at campaigning for cycleways.

#### 258. Task groups & Working Parties

#### Highways – Councillor Morshead

Councillor Morshead had requested a meeting with officers at CCC to discuss the numerous issues with regards to the junction near the BP Garage. One included the installation of a yellow box, to allow traffic to get out of Erithway Road, the timing of the traffic lights needed review, the Traffic light filter was not working. Due to the increase in traffic a request to be made for the lights on the island to be on all the time.

**ACTION**: Invite Highways (Ian Lewis) to March's meeting.

# Kings Hill – Councillor Davies

On Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> January I attended the first of two public consultations in Leamington, which took place to provide the public with an opportunity to discuss and ask questions about the South Warwickshire Local Plan which embraces the whole of Warwick District Council and Stratford-on-Avon District Council areas in a joint exercise for the development, mainly to address the need for new housing.

The representative I spoke with acknowledged the error of the Office for National Statistics population projections up to the year 2031 for Coventry but advised me that the Census 2021 had shown that the population expectations for the South Warwickshire area exceeded previous estimates and therefore Kings Hill might not be required for Coventry 'overspill' but for Warwickshire overspill.

Either way Kings Hill will be developed in the near future, no timing having been given to date but it will be for Warwickshire housing requirements and not for Coventry.

This change raises all sorts of questions of how Kings Hill will be developed as it was the wish of Coventry to have up market housing as this was perceived to be the most urgent shortage but Warwick District Council have a need for affordable housing and have stated in the past that at least 40% of the site will be reserved for this purpose.

Since Kings Hill is no longer a Coventry requirement, how will the need for schooling be addressed. Will the plan to demand more places at our two Finham schools still stand. We need to know.

There are many other answers we need to know. Whatever is decided for the future of Kings Hill, some of those decisions will undoubtedly affect the lives of Finham residents.

For instance, the estimated increase in vehicles using the immediate area exceeds 8,100, which is Coventry City's estimate. How will the roads in this area cope. At peak times they are at gridlock now.

As far as we know, there is no infrastructure plan to improve the roads in the area to manage such a huge increase in traffic. Kings Hill, when house building is completed will be 2½ times the size of Finham.

To date Warwick District Council has shown a willingness to converse with the Parish Councils affected by the plans and appear to show an eagerness to know what we think and take on board measures to minimise the short-term disruption and long term effects which are inevitable and to help maintain our standards of living as much as it is possible to do so.

The Finham Parish Council are currently awaiting a second invitation to attend a meeting of Parish Councils in the Town Hall, Learnington. Hopefully it will be held in the very near future so that we might learn more of what is to befall us and have some influence on the decisions made.

The FPC is determined to make sure no construction traffic is allowed to use Green Lane. The ancient hedgerows are preserved. The TPOs (Tree Preservation Orders) are honoured, the 23 ponds are not removed. There is a green barrier between the hedgerows and the development, the bus gate plans are eliminated, the roundabout at the bottom of Green Lane junction with Howes Lane is changed for the benefit of local residents etc. etc.

We have to live with this development, let's all make it as palatable as possible.

Be in no doubt, Kings Hill will be affecting our lives and the lives of those who live in this area long after we have gone. We owe it to future generations to make sure that the decisions made now are for the benefit of those who live here and not for the profit motive of developers.

On a lighter note, the Kings Hill Film, a record of Kings Hill now before the development, was posted on Pride in Finham with the able assistance of Tony Swann who showed me how to do it. Again, our thanks go to Fin Gibbs who produced it.

**ACTION**: Councillor Davies to make arrangements for a drone to film over Kings Hill.

<u>Kings Hill</u> - In December 2019, 100 residents attended CCC Planning Committee in relation to the Kings Hill Development. We are now in 2023 the question was asked, what is causing the delay in the development starting? It was confirmed that the reason for the delay or the proposed start date was unknown.

Councillor Sawdon reported that he had spoken with the developers and suggested that they meet after the Easter break, this is when they would be getting together their plans to put into WDC. He also confirmed that he had attended several meetings with Councillor Day and intended to have many more.

<u>Speed watch</u> – Councillor Sawdon confirmed that Officer Darren Betts had informed him that there would be a police speed watch in Gretna Road.

**ACTION**: Clerk to email Darren Betts to ensure that Tony Swann Finham Neighbourhood Watch and Councillor Mrs Fryer (FPC Police liaison) be kept better informed.

**ACTION**: Councillor Blundell to send the Clerk the list of dates for Speedwatch.

<u>Police Liaison Committee</u> – the next police liaison committee meeting had been arranged for 21<sup>st</sup> March but this was the same date as a Full Council meeting so the meeting may be moved.

Tony NHW – there had been an incident a week ago involving pupils from Finham Primary School. Within 24 hours the snap shot had been shared with the school and the matter dealt with. Thank you to the 2 Councillors with their speedy assistance.

<u>Brentwood Avenue</u> – parishioner thanked the FPC for the support of the traffic calming initiative. As far as his efforts were concerned he had sent his opinion of the options to CCC. He had received correspondence from Councillor Hetherton which was supportive.
